- 2. Performing Arts Business and Organisations
- 3. Contemporary Performance Practice and the Students' Place Within the Industry

Each individual student will be asked to undertake research into, and analysis of, the creative output and agenda of specific contemporary companies or individuals.

Module Aims and Learning Outcomes

Module Aims

To provide the student with:

- An overview of contemporary entertainment and performing arts creative, business and commercial practice;
- The opportunity to develop their research, analysis, writing and presentation skills;
- The knowledge and understanding of the entertainment and performing arts industries and specifically for them to reflect upon their own learning and development and gain an understand their potential role within the performing arts.

After completing the module, the student should be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate an analytical understanding of a range of creative issues and practices in the contemporary entertainment and performing arts creative practice.
- 2. Demonstrate an understanding of professional and business structures and working practices in the contemporary entertainment and performing arts economies.
- 3. Demonstrate the ability to undertake independent, analytical and guided research, analysis, and evaluation.
- 4. Demonstrate the ability to develop coherent arguments and present them with clarity.

Formative Assessment

You will undertake formative assessment during this module as set by the lead tutor.

Formative assessment is an essential tool for you and tutor to understand the quality and level of your learning and to identify areas for improvement. It also acts as a guide for the final assessment so that you understand not only what the tutor is looking for, in terms of learning outcomes, but also the level of attainment, in terms of Marking Criteria. Formative assessment also allows you to reflect upon your own practice and observe and recognise learning in your peers.

You will also receive constant formative feedback during the module. This should be recorded in your students' workbooks and may be inspected as part of the final assessment. This feedback should then be incorporated into your work.

Module Specific

No formative assessments are planned for this module during the year. However, the module requires intense discussion groups and interaction between the students on the different topics and objects of investigation.

Description of the Assessment Task

The assessment will evaluate your skills, knowledge, ability and understanding as measured against the Learning Outcomes.

The assessment task is to undertake an analysis and evaluation of an aspect of contemporary performance practice.

ANALYSIS AND EVALUATION

Individually you are asked to write a 2,000-word essay exploring an aspect of contemporary performance organisation (company, theatre, agency, etc).

Please note we do not want a historical description but rather an evaluation and analysis of their activity, from a business, management and artistic perspective.

You should only include historical information where it is pertinent to your evaluation and analysis. You should develop a clear, concise and well-developed argument.

The essay should be structured with:

- An introduction with your thesis
- A literature review / state of art (competitors)
- The case study analysis
- A conclusion
- Bibliography / references list using the Harvard Reference system

FINAL

All the students will receive an Essay and Academic Writing Handout, attached to this module.

Students should agree the topic to be investigated through the assessment task with the Module Leader.

Each individual student will be asked to undertake research into, and analysis of, the creative output and agenda of specific contemporary companies or individuals (i.e. working now).

The topics explored by the students will be guided and approved by the Module Leader to ensure a broad cross section of the economy is explored. Students will be supported in this activity by lectures on research methods and critical analysis.

This module is common to all CPD programmes at the IAB. The students' individual work on contemporary theatre practice will be focused within their own discipline.

The essay must be a minimum of 2000 words (maximum 2250). Essays must be written in Helvetica font 11 using 1.5 spacing. This assessment will be marked anonymously so you should not include your name, but instead use your student ID number, programme of study and the title of the assignment in the top, left-hand corner. For example:

Marking Criteria

You will be given a mark based upon the below criteria.

Content (30%)

You will be assessed considering the contents of your paper. The choice of the case study is not only a matter of personal interest you should choose it carefully according to the prominent or interesting role that it could have in the field of performing arts. Please remember that you should include at least one detailed evaluation and analysis of one piece of work which exemplifies their practice – remember evaluation and analysis not description. Please remember that a lack of methodology will affect the development of the contents. Remember that the paper must be analytical and demonstrate a critical approach, it is not a merely description of the life and work of an author or the history of a movement (shared point with methodology and approach).

Methodology and approach (30%)

You have to demonstrate a good understanding of methodology in research and data collection. Remember that not every book and/or article has the same impact factor in the field. Some works are seminal and officially considered more important than others. You will need to undertake a considerable amount of research (the internet is not enough, and internet sources can only account for 20% of your bibliography. Exceptions are official newspapers articles, journal articles, reviews and similar that are published on the internet, e.g. a review published on on-line version of "The Times". In that case, it would be considered similar to a draft sources).

FINAL

Structure and form (30%)

A good essay is also an ordered essay. You will be assessed on the structure of your paper, the use of paragraphs, layouts, use of italics/underlined/bold, headings and chapters, word limit. In the form, you will be assessed also on the style (academic, formal, informal) and target (if the writing is for the right academic audience/reader). Please consider that an academic paper required a formal style/register. Additionally, also the formal writing of references/quotes, bibliography and notes will be considered.

Grammar and spelling (10%)

Accuracy in all aspects of grammar and spelling will be assessed for example: paragraph and sentence construction, accurate use of punctuation throughout the essay, breadth, depth and accuracy of accurately spelt vocabulary and, please note, use of text language will incur an automatic penalty.
